This lovely report from our Girls' Football Leaders got accidentally deleted at the last minute from our previous newsletter! Whoops – sorry girls.

On the 8th of March, Mrs Lawlor and Mr Toomer (who are both passionate about sport and about equal opportunities) led a girls' football afternoon, ably supported by Rebecca, Mollie, Ruby, Skylar, Neve and Tayla. Here's what the girls thought...

Last Friday, all of us girls across the school got together for the country's biggest ever football session.

Last year, on the 8th of March, 285000 girls, across the country, all joined in!

In 2022, The England woman's football team won the Euros football competition. Since then the lionesses and the football association have been campaigning for equal access for girls and woman's football. We think equal access to football for girls is really important at school and at grassroots level and we wanted to inspire other girls to join clubs such as Hythe, Fawley or Totton.

Phone Safety

We know that some of our older children have access to a smart phone and/or regularly access the internet through gaming or via other devices.

Like you, we have huge concerns about the potential risks of on-line bullying, of children accessing inappropriate content and of on-line stranger danger. We actively teach our children about staying safe on-line, but we don't feel this teaching on its own is nearly enough to protect them.

We also know some of our children message each other during evenings and weekends. Unsupervised messages can cause real stress. If a child receives an unkind or inappropriate message on a screen, he or she may be affected in a different way than if the comment were spoken. Sometimes comments may not be intentionally unkind, they may be intended as jokes or just be open to interpretation.

We are finding that sometimes messages will be exchanged at weekends and parents will be unaware until something is said in school and staff become involved. Occasionally a child can feel embarrassed/humiliated that their friends may have seen a particular message and not feel able to speak about it. This can mean that a child is potentially worrying without parents being able to provide reassurance. As we approach a holiday, I wanted to just draw this to your attention so that, if your child messages with friends, you might consider being extra vigilant.

- Be open and talk with your child about their mobile phone use.
- Keep phones out of bed.
- Explore the real world.
- Encourage children to speak up if they're feeling down.
- Set a password to prevent bullying, sexting, or breaches of private information.
- Tape a recovery phone number to the mobile.
- Set up emergency contacts.
- Set up remote locate/lock/wipe features.

Sensational Skipping


